2. Executive Summary

2.1 Executive Summary

2.1.1 Objective

The objective of the Florida Atlantic University (FAU) Laboratory Schools District Best Practices Assessment is to demonstrate to the district School Advisory Body (SAB) that a school security risk assessment was completed by the October 1, 2025 due date as required by Florida Law (s. 1006.07(6)(a) 4., F. S.) and that the findings and recommendations of these assessments were presented to Superintendent, Dr. Joel Herbst and each member of the FAU Laboratory School SAB. This Executive Summary will address the efforts of FAU Laboratory School with regard to legislative compliance under the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act (MSDPSA) (Public Safety - Chapter 2018-3, Laws of Florida), the recommendations of the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission recommendations as implemented into Florida law (Chapter 2019-22, Laws of Florida), and best practices related to school safety and security. Furthermore, this summary identifies strategies and activities that the FAU Lab School and SAB considers implementing in order to address the assessment findings and improve school safety and security.

2.1.2 Positive School Measures

The positive school measures in place at the time the school security risk assessment was conducted for this year range from emergency drill completion to 3M Film application to exterior windows.

The measures are as follows:

- -4 SROs / FAU PD
- -Contraband detection K-9
- -Fencing
- -Access control devices (fob) upgrades
- -Drill requirements met
- -FortifyFL app promoted
- -Mobil panic alarm systems
- -Security camera upgrades
- -Window film project (3M)
- -Behavioral threat assessments (training, meeting schedules, records management)
- -Digital maps of all buildings on campus

- -Upgrading cameras as needed
- -Bi-directional antenna project to increase radio frequency connectivity

- -Upgrade interior and exterior lighting as needed for enhanced video surveillance

Based on the results of the school-based FSSAT, there are additional steps to be taken. The items listed in the School Security Risk Assessment Results Summary should be addressed in the next 12 months and completed where possible. There are additional long term steps to be taken. The district should begin the evaluation phase of these projects this year such as

Evaluating the effectiveness of the new threat assessment reporting system (security/ professional development and school transformation).

Creating a maintenance plan for the technology enhancements (access control, CCTV, visitor management, panic alarms, etc.) to include replacing equipment as it nears end of life (security/information technology).

Ensuring the district's master safety plan incorporates appropriate safety and security training

security/professional development and school transformation).

Regular performance monitoring of grant funded projects (security/procurement).

The following items should be implemented within 12 to 18 months: upgrade, replace, or repair cameras; ongoing enhance communication systems; and

provide ongoing training to staff. Longer-term projects include the BDA project, and establishing, and implementing an ongoing maintenance plan

The superintendent and entire school safety team are committed to implementing the recommendations and findings that were identified within the Florida Safe School Assessment Tool (FSSAT) for 2025-2026. The School Advisory Body (SAB) was briefed on all findings and recommendations by the District School Safety Specialist in executive session on October 15, 2025. The recommendations were agreed upon. Therefore, in accordance with the provisions outlined in section 1006.07(6), F.S., the aforementioned assessment findings as well as the recommended strategies and activities to improve

school safety and security are hereby presented to the SAB for consideration and approval.

Sargent Cave and the Chief of Police are consulted on all matters of school safety.
